### Minutes of the 1991 Business Meeting

Twenty-one people convened for the IMS business meeting on Saturday, May 11, 1991.

Jean Harden, President, called the meeting to order at 12:30. Thanks were expressed to Jean Widaman for putting out the Spring 1991 Newsletter and to Barbara Altmann for straightening out the Society's finances.

With regard to the Newsletter, Jean's job as editor is to put it together; contributions must come from members. The bibliography should continue to include work in progress. Two people were elected to coordinate the bibliography— Laurence de Looze for literary items and Larry Earp for musical items.

The deadline for submissions to the newsletter was set as March 15th, 1992. Jean asked contributors to annotate bibliographical items wherever possible. She also suggested an issues-oriented bibliography that would interest people in both literature and music-for instance, recent work on textual transmission and editing. Items for a Machaut discography are also welcome.

Barbara Altmann stated that a dues reminder will be sent out in the Fall. It should mention that the Newsletter will go only to those who have paid.

Jean Harden reminded members that new work coming out might be dedicated to the memory of Sarah Jane Williams, the first president of the Society. Offprints of such articles should be sent to Clem Williams at 523 Anderson Street, Greencastle, Indiana 46135. Ars Lyrica's Spring 1991 issue will be dedicated to Sarah. There is as yet no projected date for its appearance.

Elections were held for president, vice president, and two board members since Jean Harden, Jim Wimsatt, Laurence de Looze, and Sylvia Huot had completed their terms. Since it is customary for the vice-president to become president, it was moved that Jim Wimsatt should take over that post. The motion carried. Following the principle of alternating between literature and music people, Larry Earp was nominated and elected as the new vice-president. Laurence de Looze said that he was willing to stand for another term on the Board. (Motion carried.) Barton Palmer was proposed (in absentia) as the second appointment to the Board. (Motion carried.) Jean Harden is to notify him by mail.

Don't forget to meet in Room 307 at 9:30 on Thursday. This may take some effort since this is the first time we've met in the morning on the first day of the conference. Certainly someone should provide cappuccino and pastries for those who turn up!

Perhaps a major performance group such as the Hilliard Ensemble or Project Ars Nova (P.A.N.) could participate in the session, then give an evening performance of the Mass. Jean Harden will discuss possible performance groups with Otto Gründler. Becky Baltzer has already proposed a paper for such a session. Perhaps Daniel Leech-Wilkinson could be invited to come to the U.S. to give a paper on the Mass. Can we help facilitate this by setting up speaking engagements at our schools?

The meeting was adjourned at 1:20.



### Notes from the Editor

Astute Ymaginer readers may have noticed that the contents of our newsletter have varied somewhat from issue to issue. This, of course, reflects the varied nature of your contributions. In the 1990 issue, "Last Year at Kalamazoo" filled nearly three pages with your reflections on the previous year's Machaut sessions, while the bibliography occupied only one page. The 1991 issue featured two abstracts for that year's sessions and one discussion of a session from the previous year. The Machaut bibliography had grown to two pages. This year, thanks to the efforts of Larry Earp, Laurence de Looze, and several others who sent in listings, the bibliography of recent Machaut research and discography of recordings of Machaut's music threaten to take over the newsletter. Obviously, Machaut studies are thriving!

Since the 1977 Machaut conference in New York we have seen fourteenth-century scholars in literature and music sharing their findings in conferences and publications with increasing frequency. Recent examples include the publication of Kevin Brownlee's and Margaret Bent's papers on Motet 15 that grew out of a 1989 Princeton colloquium, "The Gothic Motet: Politics, Words and Music in the Fourteenth Century." The papers in *The Union of Words and Music in Medieval Poetry*, many by members of our Society, are the fruit of the 1987 conference at the University of Texas, Austin, as is the companion tape by Sequentia. In addition, we see more collaboration on editions, such as Jim Wimsatt's and William Kibler's edition of *Le Jugement du roy de Behaigne* and the *Remede de Fortune* with music edited by Becky Baltzer. IMS members might also be interested in Peter Lefferts' and Sylvia Huot's edition, *Five Ballades for the House of Foix*, Antico Edition, 1989.





This set provides one of the largest recent recorded collections of Machaut's music. You may have trouble finding the LPs, however.

Not the best recording of B34; includes some late 14th-century chansons in very weird performances, especially "Puisque je suis fumeux, plains de fumee," with its refrain, which remains highly relevant today—"Quant on fume sans fayre autruy damage."

L'art des jongleurs, Vol. 2. Ensemble Tre Fontane. 1989. Scalen disc TRFC 0389 (SCA 470) (CD).

Fortunately not available in this country. Resist the temptation to buy it if you see it at FNAC Montparnasse or FNAC Bastille (Machaut—sort of—as the take-off for Middle-Eastern fantasies).


First-rate performances; well worth having.
