IMS PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

WELCOME EVERYONE TO 2023'S NEW SLETTER!

I had the great pleasure of being able to see a number of you at the Kalamazoo International Congress for Medieval Studies. After three years in which the conference was either cancelled or online, it was invigorating to experience it in the flesh and greet many old friends.

Shortly after Eastertide, When every creature rejoices, Some of us found ourselves Once more at Kalamazoo.

The IMS's three sessions at Kalamazoo were splendid. Over the past few years we've seen an expansion of our remit to include subjects related to, but not exclusively about Machaut and his milieu. Once again we experienced this more expansive perspective and made connections with scholars in other fields. Dominique Battles gave a fascinating presentation on the History of St Erkenwald that prompted thoughts on indigenous identity in the face of invasion. Kate Maxwell's excellent paper explored bi/pantextuality and queer encounters in relation to digitized manuscripts. Anna Zayaruznaya gave an honest and engaging account of their struggles with researching Philippe de Vitry and how to broach difficult topics such as consent. My own paper on the citation network diagram of Machaut publications questioned where we could go next with this kind of work.

A roundtable on the phenomenology of performance featured contributions from Lawrence Earp, Justin Lavacek and Áine Palmer. In addition to our IMS sponsored sessions, Emily Korzeniewski also gave a paper on Machaut's notation in one of the musicology sessions.

At this sweet time, in the month of May, We elegantly arrayed ourselves And set forth once more Into lecture theatres of the University of Western Michigan.

A big thank you to Ben Albritton and Elizabeth Harper for presiding over these sessions and welcoming our speakers!

One very special consequence of meeting in person was the opportunity to perform Machaut's music again. Anna Zayaruznaya, Luke Conklin and Ι accompanied Larry Earp's roundtable contribution on 'Nes que on porroit' with a rendition of the ballade and also provided some examples to illustrate points. It was exhilarating to work with expert musicians again and fill WMich's Fetzer Center with joyful noise! Zoom may have been a wonderful tool for connection while we were all under lockdown, but they haven't yet worked out how synchronise to а live performance...

I was particularly heartened that our sessions were so welcoming and inclusive.

> Dismantling Illusions & Decentering Perspectives: Rethinking Approaches to the Medieval Survey Classroom

* IN PERSON *

The medieval survey classroom often presents itself as representing a complete, albeit brief, overview of the literature of the middle ages. This, however, is hardly true. Instead, it presents the path of least resistance, altering its offerings to make nods towards current scholarship regarding major figures without considering the full context of their works in their own time, much less acknowledging how elements of nineteenth-century thinking remain as cysts in the study of the redress period. As for these misconceptions this session will explore how pedagogy can foreground lesserknown authors and cross the contrived divide between English and French studies.

"The Intrusion of Gaia": Textual, Musical, and Material Ecologies of the Later Middle Ages

* IN PERSON *

This session explores the concept of ecological intrusion when human exceptionalism is threatened, challenged, or reassessed through the encroachment of non-human and more-than-human agencies - within the textual, musical, and material environments of Guillaume de Machaut and his global contemporaries. We welcome contributions that address the fragilities of anthropocentrism exposed by thematic, formal, sensorial, and material zones of entanglement and interdependency that reveal the productive and/or destructive potentialities of more than human worlds.

Old Questions, New Discoveries: Revisiting the Relationship between Author and Manuscript

* HYBRID *

A slew of recent discoveries has reshaped our understanding of Guillaume de Machaut's biography, his patrons, his material legacy and the circulation of his works. This session will concentrate on how close inspection molds this process of reassessment, from the level of fine detail to large-scale theorization and interpretation. The society solicits contributions from Machaut students and scholars, of course, but the topic is sufficiently general, we hope, to attract interesting papers relating to the intersection of other authors and manuscripts of the late fourteenth and early fifteenth centuries.




The International Machaut Society is hoping to have a presence at the Leeds Medieval Congress, July 1–4, 2024.

<u>Please note</u>: You can present only one paper at Leeds, so we cannot submit your name if you have already submitted a paper to the IMC either as an individual paper proposal or to another session. You will need to be able to attend in person (or online if a hybrid session is offered) and pay the programming and registration fee. Following in the footsteps of some of the recent transcription challenges such as "<u>Le Pelerinage de Damoiselle Sapience</u>" and "<u>La Sfera</u>", we have decided to launch a Machaut challenge.

Since Machaut's manuscripts have been transcribed (several times over in some cases), we are taking a different approach and will be holding a

Lemmatization Challenge

Lemmatization is the process that converts words into their meaningful base form. For example, inflected verb forms will be identified with their infinitive and the part of speech being used will be recorded (this is very useful for medieval texts where orthography can be slippery!).

FORTHCOMING

We have decided that a

LEMMATIZATION CHALLENGE

This will result in a dataset that we can explore using text mining tools and that will allow us to gain a greater insight into Machaut's style of writing and preferred modes of expression.

The IMS Lemmatization Challenge will likely take place early in 2024.


Decolonizing Workshop



This book is the first collective examination of late medieval intimate first-person narratives that blur the lines between author, narrator, and protagonist and usually feature personification allegory and courtly love tropes, creating an experimental new family of poetry. In this volume, contributors analyze why the allegorical first-person romance embedded itself in the vernacular literature of Western Europe and remained popular for more than two centuries.

The editors identify and discuss three predominant forms within this family: debate poetry, dream allegories, and autobiographies. Contributors offer textual analyses of key works from late medieval German, French, Italian, and Iberian literature, with discussion of developments in England, as well.

Allegory and the Poetic Self offers a sophisticated, theoretically current discussion of relevant literature. This exploration of medieval "I" narratives offers insights not just into the premodern period but also into Western literature's subsequent traditions of self-analysis and identity crafting through story-telling.



Courtly and Queer. Deconstruction, Desire, and Medieval French Literature

The Ohio State University Press, 2022

In *Courtly and Queer*, Charlie Samuelson casts queerness in medieval French texts about courtly love in a new light by bringing together for the first time two exemplary genres: high medieval verse romance, associated with the towering figure of Chrétien de Troyes, and late medieval dits, primarily associated with Guillaume de Machaut. In close readings informed by deconstruction and queer theory, Samuelson argues that the genres' juxtaposition opens up radical new perspectives on the deviant poetics and gender and sexual politics of both.

Contrary to a critical tradition that locates the queer Middle Ages at the margins of these courtly genres, *Courtly and Queer* emphasizes an unflagging queerness that is inseparable from poetic indeterminacy and that inhabits the core of a literary tradition usually assumed to be conservative and patriarchal. Ultimately, *Courtly and Queer* contends that one facet of texts commonly referred to as their "courtliness"—namely, their literary sophistication—powerfully overlaps with modern conceptions of queerness.


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
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
